FIVE MOSNS Dance Festival



YVONNE CHOUTEAU

March 7, 1929 – January 24, 2016

Yvonne Chouteau (Shawnee) was born in Fort Worth, Texas and raised in Vinita, Oklahoma. She debuted with the Ballet Russe de Monte Carlo at the young age of 14 and danced with the company for 14 years. In 1947, she made history as the youngest individual ever inducted to the Oklahoma Hall of Fame. In 1960, Chouteau became an artist in residence at the University of Oklahoma and established the Depart-

ment of Dance, now known as the OU School of Dance, with her husband, Miguel Terekhov. She also founded Oklahoma City Civic Ballet, now known as Oklahoma City Ballet, in 1963.



ROSELLA HIGHTOWER January 10, 1920 – November 4, 2008

Rosella Hightower (Choctaw) was born in Durwood, Oklahoma. She danced with several influential companies including the Ballet Russe de Monte Carlo, Ballet Theatre, Rene Blum's Original Ballet Russe and Grand Ballet du Marquis de Cuevas. Rosella Hightower founded the Center for Classical Dance in Cannes, France, in 1962. She was crucial to the launch of the Prix de Lausanne ballet

competition in the early 1970s, and in 1981, she became the first American director of the Paris Opera Ballet.

FIVE MOONS



MOSCELYNE LARKIN January 14, 1925 – April 25, 2012

Moscelyne Larkin (Peoria/Eastern Shawnee) was born in Miami, Oklahoma. At 15 years of age, she was accepted into and danced with the renowned Original Ballet Russe and the Ballet Russe de Monte Carlo companies. She and her husband, Roman Jasinski, founded the Tulsa Civic Ballet in 1956, later to become Tulsa Ballet Theatre. She organized the first Oklahoma Indian Ballerina Festival in 1967, in which four of the Five Moons performed to honor their heritage.

In 1991, she was awarded an honorary Doctor of Fine Arts from the University of Tulsa for her international dancing achievements.



MARIA TALLCHIEF

January 24, 1925 – April 11, 2013

Maria Tallchief (Osage) was born in Fairfax, Oklahoma, just five miles away from one of the Osage Nation's three cultural districts. She dance with the renowned Ballet Russe de Monte Carlo company in the 1940's. Tallchief is widely considered to be America's first prima ballerina. She was a principal dancer with George Balanchine's New York City Ballet, where he created several title roles for her. Tallchief

co-founded the Chicago City Ballet with her sister, Marjorie, in 1980. In Oklahoma, June 29th is known as "Maria Tallchief Day."



MARJORIE TALLCHIEF

October 19, 1926 - November 30, 2021

Marjorie Tallchief (Osage) was born in Denver and spent her childhood in Fairfax, Oklahoma with her sister, Maria. She danced with various companies, including Ballet Theatre (now known as American Ballet Theatre), the Ballet Russe de Monte Carlo and the Harkness Ballet. Tallchief was the first Native American dancer to become a premiere danseuse etoile at the world-renowned Paris Opera Ballet.

She served as the director of dance at Harid Conservatory in Boca Raton, Florida from 1989 to 1993. The University of Oklahoma in Norman presented Tallchief with a distinguished service award in 1992.

ROBERT BATTLE

Robert Battle became Artistic Director of Alvin Ailey American Dance Theater in July 2011 after being personally selected by Judith Jamison, making him only the third person to head the Company since it was founded in 1958. Mr. Battle had a long-standing association with the Ailey organization before leading the Company.

A frequent choreographer and artist in residence at Ailey since 1999, he set many of his works on Alvin Ailey American Dance Theater and Ailey II, and at The Ailey School. The Company's repertory includes his ballets Ella, For Four, In/Side, Love Stories finale, Mass, and Unfold. In addition to

expanding the Ailey repertory with works by artists as diverse as Kyle Abraham, Mauro Bigonzetti, Ronald K. Brown, Rennie Harris, and Paul Taylor, Mr. Battle has also instituted the New Directions Choreography Lab to help develop the next generation of choreographers.

In 2023, Mr. Battle stepped down from his position after 12 years as Artistic Director of Alvin Ailey American Dance Theater.



HOPE BOYKIN

Two time "Bessie Award" winner, Hope Boykin was an original member of Complexions, danced with Philadanco, and completed 20 years with the Alvin Ailey American Dance Theater. Hope has choreographed for numerous dance companies including Philadanco, Dallas Black Dance Theatre, Minnesota Dance Theater, Ballet X, Eisenhower Dance Detroit, Ballet Black of London, American Ballet Theatre Studio Company, The Philadelphia Ballet, Hubbard Street Dance Chicago and has created three works for the Alvin Ailey American Dance Theater.

Along with many commissions including Vail Dance Festival, Hope has choreographed and co-directed for off-broadway and regional theater,

including a Cornelia Street for the Atlantic Theater Company in New York City.

Hope has garnered much acclaim with her virtual work for Carolina Performing Arts, Guggenheim Works And Process Virtual Commissions initiative, and the National Black Theatre. As a motivator, Hope has been an annual keynote speaker for Lincoln Center Activate, a national education forum, which has included a special Weekend With Hope, a series of talks with friends and dance industry professionals, discussing crucial topics in our dance world.



ELISA HARKINS

Elisa Harkins is a Native American (Cherokee/Muscogee) artist, singer, dancer/choreographer, electronic music composer, and curator based in Tulsa, Oklahoma. Her work is concerned with translation, language preservation, and Indigenous musicology. Harkins uses the Cherokee and Mvskoke languages, electronic music, sculpture, and the body as her tools. She is the first person to sing a contemporary song in the Cherokee language. Harkins received a BA from Columbia College, Chicago, and an MFA from CalArts. She has since continued her education at the Skowhegan School of Painting and Sculpture. She has exhibited her work

at Crystal Bridges, documenta 14, The Hammer Museum, The Heard Museum, and MoMA.

In 2020, she created the Indigenous concert series 6 Moons and published a CD of Muscogee/Seminole Hymns. She is also the DJ of Mvhayv (muh-high-yuh) Radio, an Indigenous radio show on 99.1FM in Indianapolis, IN. Radio III /SOhOY KT (ga-wo-ni-s-gi tso-i) is a dance performance that features music and choreography by Harkins. With support from PICA and Western Front, songs from the performance have been collected into a double LP, which can be found on Harkins' Bandcamp. Harkins resides on the Muscogee Reservation and is an enrolled member of the Muscogee Nation.



MARY MARGARET HOLT

Mary Margaret Holt began her early ballet training in Austin, Texas at Austin Civic Ballet, receiving a Ford Foundation scholarship for study with the San Francisco Ballet at the age of 15. Subsequently, she received a Ford Foundation scholarship for study at the School of American Ballet, also appearing with the New York City Ballet. Holt accepted a soloist contract with Houston Ballet upon completing her BFA in Ballet Performance. While a member of Houston Ballet, she danced a wide variety of solo and principal roles in the classical and contemporary repertoire by choreographers including Stevenson, Van Manen, Van Danzig, Petipa, Balanchine, Taras, Dolin, Boris, Clouser, Franklin, Ivanov, de Mille, and O'Donnell. She also performed principal roles in Terekhov's *The Firebird, The Snow Maiden*,

and Don Quixote. She has performed as a guest artist, teacher, and choreographer with ballet and opera companies across the United States.

Holt joined the dance faculty of the University of Oklahoma School of Dance as an assistant professor, following Miguel Terekhov as chair in 1991, and an appointment as director in 1998. As director of Oklahoma Festival Ballet, Holt has choreographed over forty ballets and operas and led Oklahoma Festival Ballet on tours to France (six), the Internationale Haydntage in Austria (2), Mexico (3), Taiwan, China, and Ecuador.



MARIA KONRAD

Maria A. Konrad graduated from the A.W. Dreyfoos High School of the Arts in West Palm Beach and holds a BFA in Performing Arts from The University of the Arts in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania. Her work Maestro was commissioned for the Mariinsky under the direction of Yuri Fateev. She was commissioned to set two works for the 2022 and 2023 International Nervi Festival in Italy which featured dancers from ABT Studio Company and Adji Cissisko (LINES) with the music of Karen LeFrak. Her work has been presented by Oklahoma City Ballet 2, Nashville Ballet 2, and the main company for Kansas City Ballet's New Moves series.

She spent three seasons with Philadelphia Ballet 2 for *Dear Charlie*, a world premiere of PHrentetic, which was a collaborative project with Mural Arts Society and Philadelphia musicians, and Behind the Stage Door with The Big Picture Society. Ms. Konrad's choreography has been presented nationally at the Spoleto Festival, The Fringe Festival, Miami Dade Cultural Center, The Kravis Center, Next Generation Ballet and has collaborated with artistic organizations such as Palm Beach Symphony, Palm Beach Pops and Oklahoma City Philharmonic. She choreographed Les Pêcheurs de Perles and Aida for Opera Tampa.



RACHEAL NYE

Racheal Nye joined Oklahoma City Ballet as the Director of the Yvonne Chouteau School and Studio Company in 2020. Racheal was previously Principal of Kansas City Ballet School where she created and oversaw their Pre-Professional Day Program. She also worked as Children's Ballet Coach and staged children's roles in the company's productions including Devon Carney's *The Nutcracker*, which toured to the Kennedy Center in Washington, D.C. She is a graduate of the Kirov Academy in Washington, D.C., where she attended on scholarship and studied with Nikolai Morozov, Alla Sizova, and Elena Vinogradova. She then joined Ballet Internationale in Indianapolis and continued training with Irina Kolpakova and Vladien

Semenov. In 2000, Racheal joined Nevada Ballet Theatre and was promoted to principal in 2006. Racheal has danced leading roles in *Giselle*, *Swan Lake*, *Don Quixote*, *Cinderella*, Balanchine's *Serenade* and *Who Cares?*, as well as works by Twyla Tharp, Choo San Goh, Val Caniparoli, and many others. She has performed internationally including in Luxembourg, Korea, and Portugal.



ALEXEI RATMANSKY

Born in St. Petersburg, Alexei Ratmansky trained at the Bolshoi Ballet School in Moscow. He was a principal dancer with the Ukrainian National Ballet, Royal Winnipeg Ballet, and Royal Danish Ballet. As a choreographer, Mr. Ratmansky has created ballets for Dutch National Ballet, Kirov Ballet, Royal Danish Ballet, Royal Swedish Ballet, New York City Ballet, San Francisco Ballet, and the State Ballet of Georgia. His 1998 work, Dreams of Japan, earned a prestigious Golden Mask Award by the Theatre Union of Russia.

In 2003, Mr. Ratmansky was invited to mount a full-length ballet, *The Bright Stream*, at the Bolshoi Theatre, a production which would win for him the

appointment of Bolshoi Theatre artistic director in 2004. For the Bolshoi Ballet, he also choreographed full-length productions of *The Bolt* (2005) and re-staged *Le Corsaire* (2007) and the Soviet-era *Flames of Paris* (2008). Under Mr. Ratmansky's direction, the Bolshoi Ballet was named "Best Foreign Company" in 2005 and 2007 by The Critics' Circle in London, and he received a Critics' Circle National Dance Award for The Bright Stream.



CLARA CRAVEY STANLEY

1950 - 2022

Clara Cravey Stanley began her professional career with the Harkness Ballet of New York under the direction of Ben Stevenson. As a principal dancer she toured Europe and the Middle East performing in Switzerland, Germany, Russia, Spain, Portugal, Yugoslavia, Iran, Paris and Istanbul. She has danced at summer festivals including Spoleto, Nervi and Monte Carlo where she performed for Prince Rainier and Princess Grace of Monaco.

Mrs. Cravey was a founding member of the Ballet de Caracas in Venezuela under the direction of Vincente Nebrada with whom she toured world wide.

She has performed at the White House and at the Kennedy Center.

MIGUEL TEREKHOV

Born in Montevideo, Uruguay, to a Ukrainian immigrant father and a Charraúa Indian mother, Miguel Terekhov fell in love with dance at age seven after watching a ballet performance. He went on to have a professional career in ballet, dancing with two of the most influential touring companies of the 20th century. From 1942-47, Terekhov performed with Colonel Wassily de Basil's Original Ballets Russe and then with the Ballet Russe de Monte Carlo from 1954-58 as a principal dancer. He was best known as performer of character roles, such as the Shah in *Scheherazade*, Hilarion in *Giselle*, Dr. Coppelius in *Coppelia*, and as the General and Headmistress in

Born in Fort Worth but growing up in Vinita, OK, part French and part Shawnee-Cherokee, dancer Yvonne Chouteau began dancing at age 2 1/2 and was accepted into the Ballet Russe de Monte Carlo at age 14. Her first solo role was the Prayer in *Coppelia* and she was soon dancing major roles in *Raymonda, Paquite, The Nutcracker* and *Pas de Quatre*. While on tour with the Ballet Russe de Monte Carlo, Terekhov and Chouteau met and married. She left the company in 1957 when she was expecting her first child. In 1961, Terekhov and Chouteau began teaching in what is now the School of Dance at the University of Oklahoma. In 1963, they became the first artistic directors of the Oklahoma City Civic Ballet, now the Oklahoma City Ballet, bringing in numerous internationally acclaimed dancers to perform with the company in its early years As Chair of the (then) Department of Dance at OU, Terekhov designed a rigorous curriculum that is still largely followed today. He choreographed over thirty ballets, including seven full-length ballets, operas and musicals, and taught courses in ballet technique, teaching methods, choreography, and dance history. Miguel Terekhov died in 2012 and Yvonne Chouteau died in 2016.



GUEST ARTIST BIOGRAPHY



JEROD IMPICHCHAACHAAHA' TATE

Jerod Impichchaachaaha' Tate is a classical composer and citizen of the Chickasaw Nation in Oklahoma, dedicated to the development of American Indian classical composition. He is a 2022 Chickasaw Hall of Fame inductee and a 2022 Distinguished Alumni Award recipient from The Cleveland Institute of Music. In 2021, he was appointed a Cultural Ambassador for the U. S. Department of State.

Among many recent premieres, Tate's highlights include commissions from the New York Philharmonic, American Composers Orchestra, Cantori NY and Turtle Island Quartet. This season, Dover String Quartet tours Tate's

new quartet, Woodland Songs, Oklahoma's Canterbury Voices premieres Tate's first opera, *Loksi' Shaali'* (*Shell Shaker*), PostClassical Ensemble presents an all-American-Indian program curated by Tate in Washington D.C., and his popular work Chokfi' has been programmed by the Austin, Eureka, and Ft. Collins symphonies. Tate is currently at work on a new violin concerto for acclaimed violinist Irina Muresanu, as well as new works for the Oklahoma City Philharmonic and North Carolina Symphony Orchestra.

Tate is a three-time commissioned recipient from the American Composers Forum, a Chamber Music America Classical Commissioning Program recipient, a Cleveland Institute of Music Alumni Achievement Award recipient, a governor-appointed Creativity Ambassador for the State of Oklahoma and an Emmy Award-winner for his work on the Oklahoma Educational Television Authority documentary *The Science of Composing*. His music was also featured in the HBO series *Westworld*.

Tate earned his Bachelor of Music in Piano Performance from Northwestern University and his Master of Music in Piano Performance and Composition from The Cleveland Institute of Music. His middle name, Impichch<u>a</u>achaaha', means "their high corncrib" and is his inherited traditional Chickasaw house name. Learn more at www.jerodtate.com.



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DANCE: A Communication of the Spirit

At their best, the Arts help communicate the speech of the spirit into a universal language. This language reflects emotions and tells stories without using words. Yvonne Chouteau and Miguel Terekhov were our parents, so in our family that communication of the spirit was through the art of dance.

When they were children, each of our parents had danced at young ages, but they didn't start with ballet. As a two year old, our Mom learned the steps of ceremonial dances from her Shawnee father and then enthusiastically embraced the dances she learned at powwows that he took her to across Oklahoma. At family and social gatherings, our Dad saw and learned some of the dances popular in Uruguay, South America, where he was born.

Later, after years dedicated to learning ballet, both our parents sought to bring beauty into other people's lives through the gifts of their well-trained talents. This quote from our Mom sums up what both she and our Dad believed about performing dance for audiences: "People come to see beauty. To make people happy through dance, you must expose your soul."

As a young Terekhov family, dance played a special, all-encompassing role in our lives that wasn't limited to the classroom or stage. Sometimes, our dance would spring out while we were playing in our backyard, or on vacations, or when visiting our parents' ballet friends who also had children and were living a dancing life like ours.

During the best days of dancing together as a family, our lives would flow with happiness. Before we felt that flow, we also experienced the rigorous work and dedication that people who love dance commit themselves to do almost daily.

For decades, dance filled our lives, as well as those of the many students our parents taught. Its sweetest memories continue to echo in all our hearts today. The spirit expressed in dance will truly continue to inspire many people for all time.
